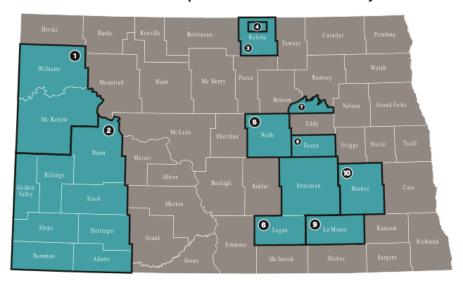

Creating a "Culture of Action"

- Coalition leadership must commit to engaging volunteers to "do the work"
- Coalition leaders must communicate and actively recruit members
- Use an "action-oriented" Agenda
- Coalition leadership must clarify the role of the coordinator

- 1. Targeted recruiting for a specific task Identify:
 - The specific task to be completed
 - Rationale & benefits of the task
 - Skills or resources needed to complete the task
 - Time commitment to complete the task
 - Benefits of volunteering for this task (WIFM)





- 2. "Plants" at coalition meetings...
 - Know what tasks will be addressed at the meeting
 - Clarify the resources needed for the task
 - Recruit 1 3 member <u>personally</u> before the meeting
 - Have the "plants" volunteer for the specific task during the meeting – then invite others to follow.

- 3. Using a Sign-up sheet for a specific task:
 - For each task, create a 1 pager that describes the task and resources needed
 - At the coalition meeting describe the task –
 pass around a sign-up sheet for the task be
 clear about what they are signing up for
 - Have a "plant" sign up ahead of time
 - Describe the specific next steps required to volunteer.

- 4. Use an Action Oriented Agenda where agenda items are:
 - Based on Action Plans & Capacity Building Plans
 - Require a decision or action from the coalition members
 - Presented (if possible) by a volunteer coalition member
 - Assigned a time limit for discussion



- 5. New member orientation meetings
 - Conduct meetings regularly or ad-hoc
 - Build relationship with new volunteers
 - Conducted by volunteers and staff
 - Describe coalition "action orientation"
 - Survey volunteers to see what they are interested in
 - Provide options for involvement





- 6. Invitation from "Key Leader" or "Supervisor"
 - Clarify task to be completed
 - Identify specific roles for sector reps or representatives from specific organization
 - Describe the task and benefits to the organization leader – ask who on their staff could participate – ask for introduction from the leader
 - If possible, have a key community leader contact the organization leader



- 7. Review action plan at coalition meetings
 - Have coalition leadership present the Action Plans
 - Clarify the "work to be done"
 - Ask the coalition to prioritize the work to do as a coalition – based on tasks they are willing to take on
 - Conduct "Action Planning" for those tasks





- 8. Identify a partner or other organization to lead a task. (This will depend on the task).
 - Clarify how the specific task fits into the overall Action Plan
 - Describe how the organization can lead the effort and the benefits to them
 - Determine the resources the Grant can provide to the organization (\$, staff, training)
