

Fed-up locals help cops bust parties

Complaints in Pine Hills lead police to 3 loud parties, resulting in arrests of a half-dozen students

ALBANY — Aggravated year-round residents of Pine Hills have helped police bust three raucous college parties in the last nine days, leading to the arrests of a half-dozen students.

Two parties less than a block from one another were broken up Friday night and early Sunday morning after neighbors called to complain of noise, police said.

On Jan. 14, a neighbor's complaint led police to a party on Morris Street as well.

Police and local government officials say the busts are due to both increased police diligence and efforts by the community to dissolve the parties that they say diminish their quality of life.

"There's a combined effort to really crack down on this," said [Albany Common Council](#) member [Anton Konev](#), whose district covers a large portion of Pine Hills. Konev said the spotlight thrown on the neighborhood after last March's "kegs and eggs" melee has encouraged neighbors to report parties, which have long been a source of contention between students and homeowners.

"This is something we've been trying to combat for years," Konev said, "changing the culture of students who treat this neighborhood as theirs and only theirs."

At 11:30 p.m. Friday, neighbors told police there was a noisy gathering near the corner of Quail and State streets, said Officer [James Miller](#). Police arrived at 170 Quail St. and found a party crowded with minors drinking, Miller said.

One of the apartment's residents, [Ronald Martino](#), 19, was charged with providing alcohol to minors. Another student who lives at the apartment, [Anthony Campisi](#), was

arrested on a warrant for failure to appear in court on a unrelated noise ordinance violation, Miller said.

About 24 hours later, another neighbor called police just after midnight to say there was a loud party near the corner of State and Ontario streets. Police arrested Robert Kirby and Michael Cariello, both of whom live in the apartment and were allegedly hosting a party at their home at which underage people were drinking. Kirby, 21, and Cariello, 20, also were charged with providing alcohol to minors.

A friend of the pair also was arrested as police were about to take Kirby and Cariello into custody. Eric Waldon got between the officers and his friends, attempting to prevent the arrests.

"I'd rather jeopardize my future than let them arrest my friends," Waldon, 21, said, according to an arrest report.

Waldon was charged with obstruction of governmental administration. The arrest report listed Waldon's condition at the time as "impaired."

Waldon, Kirby, Cariello, Martino and Campisi are all students at the University at Albany, Miller said. All five were arraigned in Albany City Court and released. Those arrests came less than a week after a neighbor's complaint resulted in two 19-year-old men being charged for allegedly hosting a keg party for 120 people. In exchange for a \$5 entry fee, Nicholas Coppola and Christopher Hagan gave partygoers at 442 Morris St., many of whom were underage, access to both cases of beer and a half-keg of beer, Miller said. Coppola and Hagan were each charged with selling alcohol to minors and selling alcoholic beverages.

Coppola is a student at Hudson Valley Community College.

In November, three UAlbany students were arrested for cramming 300 people into their apartment at 556 Washington Ave. for a party.
